

Sample Goddess Moon Circles Preschool Curriculum

The preschool curriculum is designed to have a weekly theme. 26 of the Weeks are alphabet themes. Other themes include Transportation, the magickal elements of Earth, Air, Fire and Water, and Family.

There are no less than three daily activities to work with, and there are many educational child led activities that can be utilized even when you are not “doing school” (as many preschoolers call it). Each week also contains a list of supplemental lessons.

This curriculum is intended to be child lead. The lessons provide ideas and inspiration for daily activities without tying you down to a schedule, or dictating exactly how everything should be done. This curriculum is not intended to be high pressure or feel like work to you or the student. The curriculum contains the following:

Sample Day A

Letter of the week “A”

Activities:

- 1) Introduce the letter “A”.
- 2) Play Alphabet Detective. Have children search around the home, neighborhood, park, supermarket, etc. for items that begin with the letter of the week. This can be done on any outing or any time at home when your child needs some direction in something to do.
- 3) Make Letter Collages. Print the large Letter found at the end of the lesson on a piece of cardstock and have children go through old magazines and cut out pictures of things that begin with the letter of the week and glue them to the letter. You can also create larger letters using a whole piece of poster board to create each letter. This is recommended for very popular letters.
- 4) Practice writing the Letter of the week.
- 5) Alphabet People. The Alphabet People pages are designed to be done each week when the letter of the week is introduced. Keep these pages in a folder; and at the end of 26 weeks make a book out of all the alphabet people pages.

Apple:

Activity:

- 1) Apple Taste Test: Everyday this week prepare apples in some way, to taste test. Try different varieties of apples, eat apple sauce, apple pie, apple cobbler, apple cake.

Sample Day B

Letter of the Week “C”

Activity:

- 1) Review the letter of the week

Caterpillar

Activity:

- 1) Caterpillar Color Lesson: Using different colors of construction paper cut out large circles. One circle in each color. Glue the pieces together so each circle overlaps the one before it, just a little bit. Draw a face on the first circle and on each circle in the caterpillar’s body write the color, of the circle, in marker. This caterpillar makes a great room decoration and is always available for reviewing colors.
- 2) Read the story “The Very Hungry Caterpillar” by Eric Carl
- 3) Butterfly Life-Cycle lesson: Prepare the Metamorphosis Sequence Cards, ahead of time by printing out the pictures, coloring them and covering them with clear contact paper to make them more sturdy. Teach student the stages of metamorphosis and have them put the sequence cards in order.
- 4) Metamorphosis pretend: Hold up a Metamorphosis Sequence Card and have the student pretend to be in that phase of the butterfly life-cycle.
- 5) Make a caterpillar: Glue 3 craft pom poms of the same size together. Attach google eyes to the first pom pom to make a face.

Sample Day C

Letter of the Week “F”

Activity:

- 1) Review the letter of the week

Fish

Activities:

- 1) Gone Fishing. Cut out several of the fish stencils in a variety of colors. Slide a paper clip onto the mouth of each fish. Attach some string to a stick or wooden dowel to make a fishing rod. Attach a magnet to the end of the string to act as a hook. Put the fish in a bucket and try and catch the fish. Variations of this can include creating games. Examples: the first to catch “x” number of fish, or all the fish of a particular color, put numbers on the fish and go for a high score.
- 2) Snack: Goldfish Crackers
- 3) Fish Yoga Pose. Lay flat on your back. Put the palms of your hands flat on the floor. Tuck your hands under your bum. Arch your back and tilt your head back so the crown of your head rests on the floor.
- 4) Cooking. Let your child help you prepare their favorite type of fish for lunch or dinner.
- 5) Fish Bowl. On a piece of white paper, draw the outline of a fish bowl with a heavy black marker. Have your child color in the water and glue in gold fish crackers.
